How We Have Worked, Examples of Issues Flagged

Direct Assistance for Federal Applications


- Detailed, section-by-section review of DOE Grid Resilience Formula Funding Program
 application by a southwestern state
 - Issues flagged!
 - Project goals were nonspecific and not tied to federal goals
 - Narrative needed structural changes, did not flow well
 - Funding items not prioritized well

Assistance to Local Governments for Federal Applications, via State

- Grant writing, benefit cost analysis for **DOT RAISE** grant submission by rural county, referred by state agency
 - Issues flagged!
 - Lack of necessary hard data; e.g., county had to find pedestrian counts mid-project
 - Project not in State Transportation Improvement Plan (STIP)
 - Point of contact switched mid-project



Examples of Lessons Learned





Tips and Insights

- Get your team together early
 - It will take longer than you think
- Ensure cross-sectoral involvement
 - Robust collaborations with history are more likely to be funded
- Start before the funding announcement posts
 - A lot of information is already available
- Prove it
 - No argument by assertion
- Align with federal plans, goals
 - Funders need to see you as part of the team, movement, & effort
- Be specific
 - Use SMARTIE goals
- Connect with underserved, Justice 40 communities at the beginning
 - This is a must to ensure competitive federal applications

Activities

Workforce Development: Coordinated between a state's Governor's Office and DOT to provide a clean energy workforce development landscape assessment and recommend applicable funding opportunities to advance the state's climate goals.

Stakeholder Mapping: Identifying key agency stakeholders and evaluating prior engagement activities to identify best practices, lessons learned, and recommendations for improved outreach and engagement.



Getting Started

Identify barriers to engagement and implementation

- Recognize agency and community-level barriers that may hinder outreach and implementation
- Example: Digital divides may make internet outreach less effective for some populations
- Related Technical Assistance: community engagement plan development



Identify tools and measures to achieve collective goals

- What mapping tools are available to complement federal tools? (state agencies, academic institutions, nonprofits, etc)
- Identify equitable solutions and related metrics to measure progress
- Related Technical Assistance: metrics identification, benefit-cost analysis

Get to know your community(ies)

- Engage early and proactively
- Leverage insights from previous outreach
- Ensure that the goals of your agency are aligned with community interests
- Related Technical Assistance: stakeholder mapping, workforce development analysis
